




Peek at the Week

What a busy week it has been in Waveney Class. Our focus book has been *Somebody Swallowed Stanley* by Sarah Roberts and Hannah Peck, a recently released book about plastic pollution. We talked about rubbish and sorted it into recyclable and non-recyclable items. We also talked about the dangers of plastic in the sea. Reception made posters about plastics and wrote about imaginative uses for a plastic bag, including as a kite, a rainhat and a parachute. Some of the

children are very interested in plastics, so be prepared if you take your child shopping with you, they may comment on what you're buying!

We have a seaside shop in our aquarium, so Reception have been making amounts with 1p, 2p and 10p coins to buy items. The Nursery children have enjoyed pretending to buy the sea creatures too.

Nursery have been practising counting objects and recognising numbers.

We have played a range of percussion instruments, talked about their properties and learned their names.

Some of the children treated us all to a fabulous gymnastics show and made tickets and posters for it.

We have all practised events for sports afternoon, including the Nursery children, who are welcome to join in a race if they would like to attend with parent(s).
