## MUD KITCHEN



## LEARNING CHARACTER OF THE WEEK:

### THE CONNECTING SPIDER

The Connecting Spider makes links between the different things he has been learning. He brings what he has learnt before and in different lessons and places and joins it to what he is learning now. This helps solidify and embed his learning. Meaning-making is about how we make sense of things. It is about connecting one thing to another and seeing the relationships between ideas, concepts and information and experiences. The opposite of meaning-making is data accumulation – learning empty facts without understanding. Making meaning allows us to see the narrative in a set of events rather than processing fragments of information in a disconnected, piecemeal fashion.
