## LEARNING CHARACTER OF THE WEEK: THE BUSY BEE



The Busy Bee represents our Learning Relationships. The Busy Bee, like a real bee, can work well all alone *and* as part of a team and it knows when to take on each role. We teach our children the explicit skills they need to collaborate effectively, such as: sharing, taking turns, talking about our ideas, taking on specific roles, including everyone, negotiating, agreeing and staying on task. The opposite of this learning dimension is both being 'isolated' or 'over-dependent.' We want our children to be able to make a balanced assessment of when to work alone and when to draw on the help of others, and have the skills to do both.
