BIKEABILITY—Y5 and Y6

The children in Year 5 and Year 6 (those who have yet to complete the course) have received Bikeability letters this week. The team will be in during the week of 22nd—25th January to work with our children. Our intention is for every child in Year 5 to take part, and all those in Year 6 who didn't complete the course last year. The two-day course teaches road-safety awareness, including signaling, positioning and

manoeuvring. It's a really important course to take and is one that, to our knowledge, isn't currently offered by the High Schools. So, if your child is in Year 5 or Year 6 and their bike needs a bit of TLC, now is the time to take care of this, so your child can get some practice sessions in over the Christmas holidays.
